A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT AND THE GENERAL MANAGER

By sharing this annual report, we wish to give you an overview of the activities that IRIS Mundial has accomplished during the year 2020. We are very proud of the work achieved by IRIS Mundial, its members, its employees, its volunteers and its partners despite the special circumstances of this year. Their never-ending commitment contributes day after day to allowing the most disadvantaged people to better see the world.

The year 2020 was unprecedented in so many ways. If we had been told when it started how it was going to end, we wouldn't have believed it. The Covid-19 pandemic has taken the whole world by surprise and there are few people who can say that they have not been affected in one way or another. As an international cooperation organization, IRIS Mundial was no exception, on the contrary...

However, as the context will have shown on numerous occasions, the pandemic will have allowed many people and organizations to test their capacities to adapt to change. Once again, the case of IRIS Mundial is no exception.

Thanks to strong and well-established partnerships, the activities supported by IRIS Mundial were able to continue. IRIS Mundial's permanent programs are aimed precisely at achieving better autonomy in terms of vision care in our countries of intervention and at enabling ophthalmological services to be taken over by local partners. This is in particular the case with the Program for the Prevention and Fight against Blindness (PPFB) in Saint-Louis in Senegal. This program was impacted, but was still able to continue to function at a minimum level. The year started with great fanfare for PPFB St-Louis. In addition to a three-week training program by an expert in organizational development designed to support our partner in managing the ophthalmology center and ensuring its financial autonomy, the start of 2020 witnessed the official opening ceremony of the Saint-Louis community ophthalmology center. It was a highlight for the PPFB and the event received positive media coverage nationwide. April, however, brought a total halt to its activities for three months. In June, the community center was able to reopen its doors, but it has not been possible to resume other activities (such as mobile clinics, awareness-raising, or training by Quebec professionals).

Furthermore, new avenues are explored, including remote technology cooperation. At the end of 2020 we started planning remote training sessions by videoconference.

Unfortunately, we had to suspend preparations for the 25th IRIS Mundial one-time project which was due to take place in Gabon. This project was planned for November 2020 to provide eye exams and glasses to approximately 2,000 people.

We have been quite busy since the beginning of this pandemic, despite the fact that we were unable to complete a mission. We are very fortunate to be able to continue to count on our volunteers and our partners to support us in this period which might seem less exciting, but which allows us to carry on with our current activities and give us time to consider new avenues for the organization.

We would like to offer our heartfelt thanks to our many partners, colleagues, members, volunteers, administrators and donors for their precious support and collaboration.

We have made a positive start to 2021 and are confident that we - and our partners - will continue to adapt to our new reality. We have high hopes that we will be able to meet again soon in person, and that we will once again be present for the most vulnerable populations.

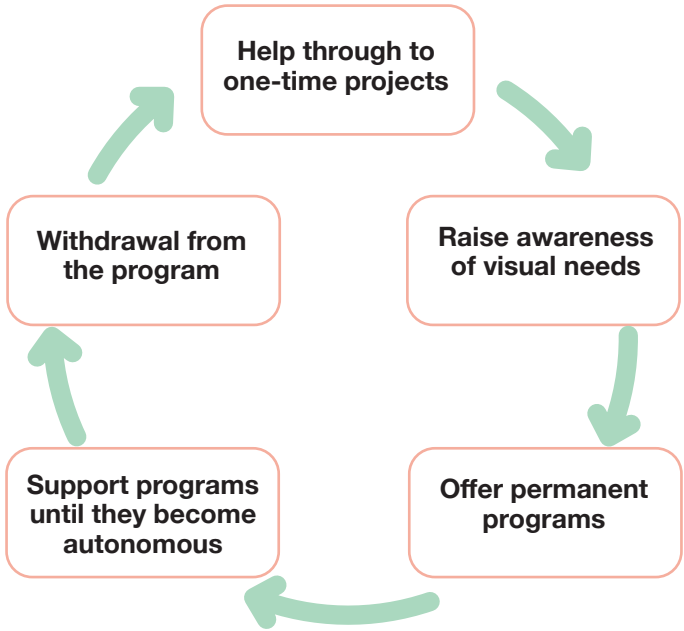
Mission IRIS Mundial is a reference body promoting the Right to Sight, which aims to improve the visual health of the most vulnerable populations in developing countries.

HISTORY

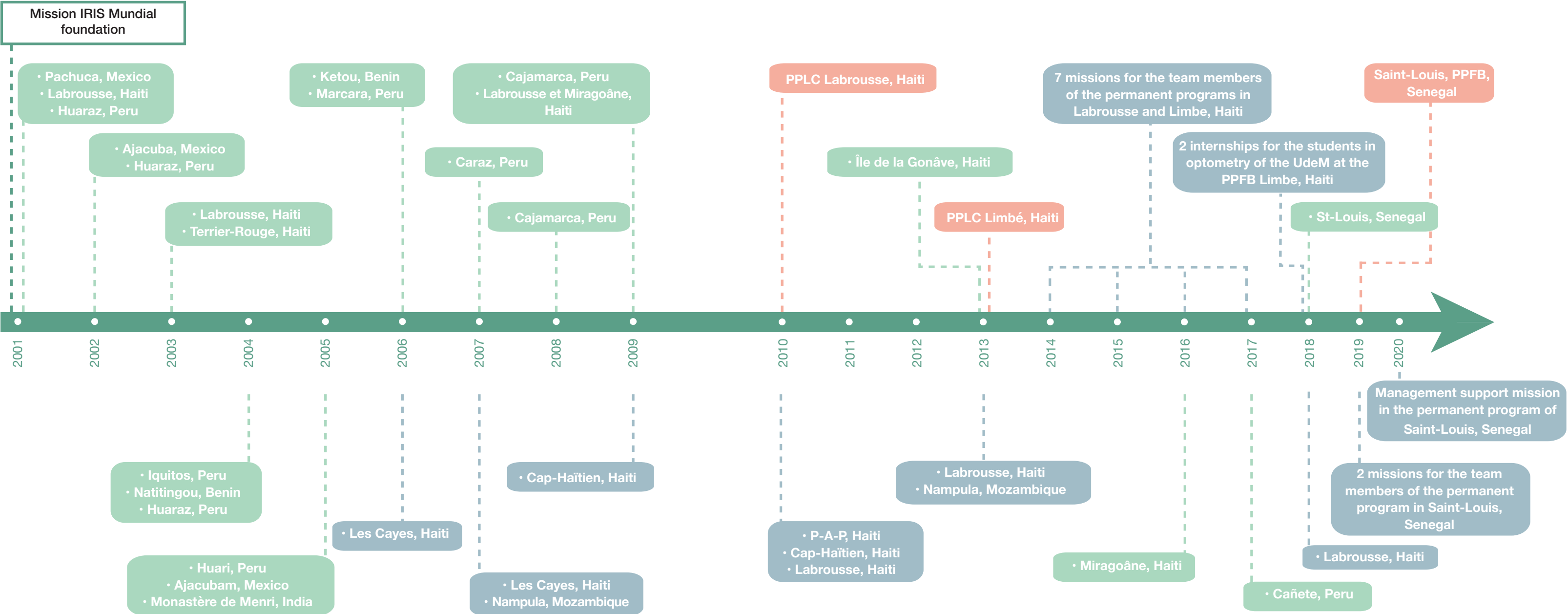

General Management:

IRIS Mundial has helped more than 93,500 persons and more than 1,000 persons has benefited from surgeries.



RELEVANCE OF PROJECTS

Globally, **1,1 billion** people live with vision loss.*

90 % of vision loss is preventable or treatable.*

90 % of those with vision loss live in low- and middle-income countries.*

Almost everyone will need access to eyecare services during their lifetime.*

55 % of people with vision loss are women and girls.*

Vision loss is habitual blurred vision (vision impairment) at distance or near. There are four categories of vision loss: blindness, moderate to severe, mild, and near. Vision loss may be permanent or it may be treatable, for example with glasses or surgery.

IRIS Mundial's activities help to reduce blindness prevalence and vision impairment among impoverished people, thereby they improve their quality of life and their participation in the socio-economic development of their community.

According to eye-care specialists, the socio-economic benefits of an effective care are far greater than the costs of non-treatment.



Economic benefits

- An increase in motor skills;
- An increased employment opportunities and incomes;
- A reduction of the economic burden on the family;
- An increase in the community productivity;
- A higher employability rate, especially among women.



Childhood benefits

Educational performance is linked to good vision. Children with vision impairment have poorer educational outcomes and are more likely to be excluded from schools. Investing in eye health services improves educational attainment and increases participation in education.



Social benefits

- A reduction of social exclusion;
- An increased participation in daily activities and leisure;
- A preservation of social status, self-esteem and well-being.

PERMANENT PROGRAMMES

IRIS Mundial aims to help developing countries reach autonomy in terms of eye care. The organization does this by establishing permanent eye care services and working with local partners by respecting existing cultures and structures in the country. In order to make visual services available throughout the year, IRIS Mundial has implemented three “Programs for the Prevention and Fight against Blindness (PPFB)” that aim to offer a quality eye care system to the most disadvantaged population located in isolated areas. The PPFB team is made up of nurses and assistants, who are joined by an ophthalmologist once a month. The program has three major goals:

- 1 To offer a permanent eye care program to the population :** and collect statistical data on the main causes of blindness and vision impairment in the area;
- 2 To provide primary, secondary and tertiary eye care:** to conduct vision screenings at the ophthalmological clinic, in mobile clinics and in schools in the area, to refer the patients who require further treatment to the ophthalmological clinic where an ophthalmologist will examine them once a month; and to offer a free eye surgery in a partner clinic to some patients.
- 3 To help improve the knowledge of the local inhabitants on visual care and how to access it:** provide public awareness and education sessions on visual hygiene, provide radio spots on visual health, create partnerships for referencing, etc.

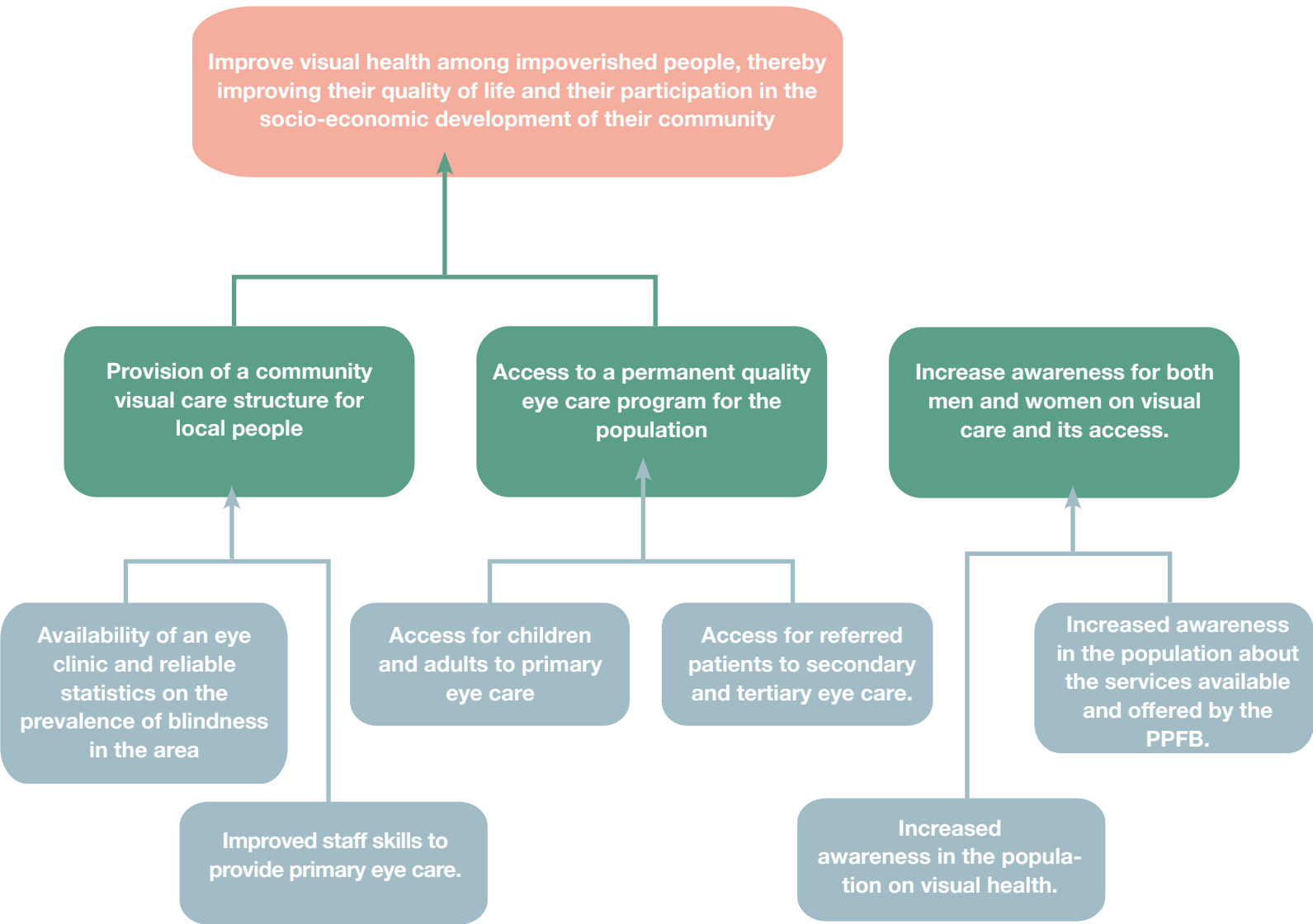
SENEGAL

Saint-Louis PPFB

Context:

Following a one-time project in November 2018, during which 30 Canadian volunteers made it possible for 2,000 people to benefit from eye care, IRIS Mondial made a commitment to supporting its Senegalese partner, the “*Association Saint-Louisienne pour la Vue*” (ASV), so they could offer an accessible eye care service for the most disadvantaged people in the Saint-Louis area.

Thanks to funding from the “*Ministère des Relations internationales et de la Francophonie*” (MRIF), IRIS Mondial obtained a grant from the Quebec International Development Program (QIDP) to support ASV in its initiative. The Program for the Prevention and Fight against Blindness (PPFB) in Saint-Louis was created on January 1 2019, for a two-year initial phase (extended by an additional 5 months due to the pandemic).



“I am a guardian in a school where I live with my wife. We have always had ocular health problems but with the few means that we have, we could not afford surgery. One day, you came to do a screening in at the school I’m working in at: my wife and I had not only benefited of this day, but we have also benefited from an eye surgery. Our life has changed ever since because, when we are healthy, we are rich!”.

TRAINING MISSIONS

Name of the project: Saint-Louis PPFB - initial phase

Area of intervention: Community Ophthalmological Center, Sanar, Saint-Louis, Saint-Louis Department, Senegal

Project date: January 1, 2019, to May 31, 2021

Total Investment: \$ 280, 000

Main Partner: « Association Saint-Louisienne pour la Vue » (ASV)

People involved: 5 employees hired for the program

Final results (2019-2020) : :

- 1067 visual screening for children
- 3724 visual screenings for adults at the permanent clinic and during mobile clinics
- 515 ophthalmology consultations and 36 eye surgeries

Other activities carried out :

- Due to the pandemic, many of the activities outside the center could not take place in 2020. Despite this, we did hold two information-sharing activities for women. These are discussion meetings during which women talk about their own visual health problems and their access to care. They are also invited to make suggestions to improve women’s access to eye care.

The badianou gokh Coumba Wade reveals the problems women face in relation to their health in general:

“We women have so many responsibilities to carry that we always put our families before ourselves, especially as far as health is concerned”.

“Neighborhood godmother”: system put in place by the government to support health structures within the population

Since knowledge sharing is a core value for IRIS Mundial, much effort is invested in providing continuing education to local vision professionals. Thanks to the expertise of the organization’s volunteers, numerous training missions are carried out with the objective of improving the quality of the eye care offered, in terms of eyewear, visual screening techniques, ophthalmological examinations or new surgical techniques. These missions are organized to provide the staff of IRIS Mundial’s permanent programs and other vision partners in developing countries the tools they need to carry out their work in a perspective of empowerment.

• **January – February 2020**

Mr. André Racine was in Senegal to work in close collaboration with the PPFB Saint-Louis employees, but also with all the members of the project implementing partner, the “Association St-Louisienne pour la Vue” (ASV). His objective was to support the organizational capacity and financial sustainability of the PPFB. The goal of this kind of mission is to ensure the sustainability of eye care services in developing countries.

According to Mr. Racine: “The three weeks of work with the organization allowed me to gather enough information to make recommendations. If implemented, these recommendations should result in an increase of the ASV management efficiency. At this point, we can remain optimistic [about the maintenance of current services after the end of the MRIF funding]. The result of the discussions is encouraging, considering their willingness and desire to make several changes in management procedures. “



• **March 2020**

On March 13, 2020, two IRIS Mundial volunteers were to fly to Senegal for 10 days to give a training session on primary eye care for the nursed and the optician of the PPFB. The day before their departure we had to cancel their mission due to the pandemic.

HAITI

• Official launch of the PPFB in Saint-Louis

The official launch of the Program for the Prevention and Fight against Blindness, funded by the “*Ministère des Relations internationales et de la Francophonie*” (Quebec Ministry of International Relations), was organized on February 12, during Mr. Racine’s mission. Despite the fact that the project started in January 2019, our partner wanted to combine the public inauguration of the newly built and functional centre with the official launch of the PPFB. Therefore, Mr. Racine participated as a representative of IRIS Mondial. Nearly 100 people attended the ceremony, including the representatives of some neighboring villages, regional and national media and service users. Official speeches to the press, a guided tour of the community ophthalmological centre and a welcome cocktail offered by the ASV, were part of the event, which was greatly appreciated by all participants! Mr. Racine explained that this event was an opportunity to see and hear many representatives of the civil society express their satisfaction and gratitude towards IRIS Mondial.



• Impacts of the pandemic

Like many countries around the world, our partner had to close the doors of its ophthalmology community center for a few months at the beginning of the pandemic. They were able to reopen the center towards the end of June and since then, the attendance is constant. However, the ASV had to stop all activities requiring large gatherings such as mobile clinics in schools and in remote communities, awareness raising and education sessions on visual health and hygiene, etc.

Due to the complete shutdown of all activities for several months, we agreed with MRIF to extend the duration of the PPFB for an additional 5 months so that we could meet the targets that had been set. The program will therefore end on May 31, 2021.

Unfortunately, the situation in Haiti did not improve in 2020. In addition to the continued deterioration of the socioeconomic situation, the country continues to experience serious political instability as well as a worrying jump in insecurity, notably due to increasingly frequent kidnappings for ransom. Adding to this situation is the Covid-19 pandemic which, fortunately, has not been as devastating as in other countries so far. In this context, it has not been possible for IRIS Mondial to send volunteers there in 2020.

Following a request from our partner, the *Centre d’Éducation et de Développement intégré-Village de l’Espoir* (CEDI-VE), IRIS Mondial provided material and equipment support for the Program for the Prevention and Fight against Blindness (PPFB) in Limbé. The initial plan was for three people from CEDI-VE to travel to Quebec in April 2020 as part of a collaboration they have with one of their other Quebec partners, and to take the material back with them. But due to the pandemic, their trip unfortunately had to be canceled. IRIS Mondial therefore sent the material by boat. It included 5 boxes containing equipment, a slit lamp, spare bulbs for their various devices, reading glasses, sunglasses, etc.



ONE-TIME PROJECTS

Background :

A one-time project is a group mission of one to two weeks, in which a multidisciplinary Canadian team of approximately 25 volunteers travel to provide a first experience in ophthalmic services (eye exams, pairs of glasses, medication and sometimes surgeries) to about 2,000 disadvantaged people in a developing country. These missions are always organized in a region where visual care isn't available, and in partnership with a local organization in the intervention area.

A lot of upstream work has to be done to realize and organize a project of this scale. Before officially launching a mission, IRIS Mundial must first:

- 1 Identify a serious healthcare local partner in a developing country;
- 2 Ensure that the country and the intervention area are safe enough to send the team of volunteers;
- 3 Identify visual problems and confirm the inaccessibility of disadvantaged populations to eye care in the area;
- 4 Validate the capacity of the local partner to support the implementation of the mission;
- 5 Validate the logistical feasibility of this kind of mission in the area.

ONE-TIME PROJECTS

Usually, an IRIS Mundial representative must be sent on-site to carry out an exploratory mission and obtain the majority of the information needed. When all the conditions are met, four mission managers create a committee to establish timelines and start implementing the next steps:

- 1 Send a call for applications to recruit the members of the team;
- 2 Organize used glasses preparation workshops at the warehouse to build a bank of more than 6,000 pairs of glasses;
- 3 Contact suppliers to obtain ocular and systemic medications, as well as surgical equipment if the project entails a surgical aspect;
- 4 Prepare the mission trays with the pairs of glasses, but also the ophthalmological equipment, as well as all the logistical material necessary for the mission;
- 5 Work with the local partner on procedures for obtaining official authorizations to realize the mission as well as the licence to practise for professionals, etc.;
- 6 Create and provide an intercultural pre-departure training for volunteers;
- 7 Carry out many other tasks related to logistics and preparation of the mission.



ONE-TIME PROJECTS

One-time project in Gabon

A multidisciplinary team of 25 volunteers should have traveled to Gabon as part of the 25th one-time project of IRIS Mundial since its creation. This project was planned for November 2020 to provide eye exams and glasses to approximately 2,000 people. Preparations for the project had started with the collaboration of the Embassy of Gabon in Canada and the recruitment of volunteers was almost finalized. Due to the pandemic we had to suspend the preparation of this mission and still do not know when it will take place.



According to the WHO, at least 2.2 billion people suffer from vision impairment or blindness. In at least 1 billion cases this vision impairment could have been prevented or has yet to be addressed.



Meritorious Service Medal (Civil Division)

The founder of IRIS Mundial, Jean-Pierre Tchang, received on July 1st, the Meritorious Service Medal (Civil Division) which recognizes his remarkable contribution “for founding IRIS Mundial, an organization that provides eye care to people living in developing countries”. The award ceremony will take place when global circumstances will permit.

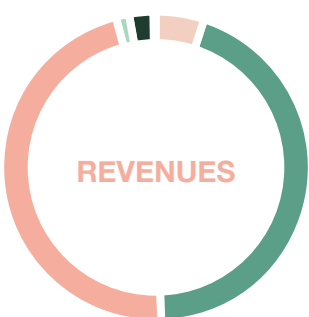

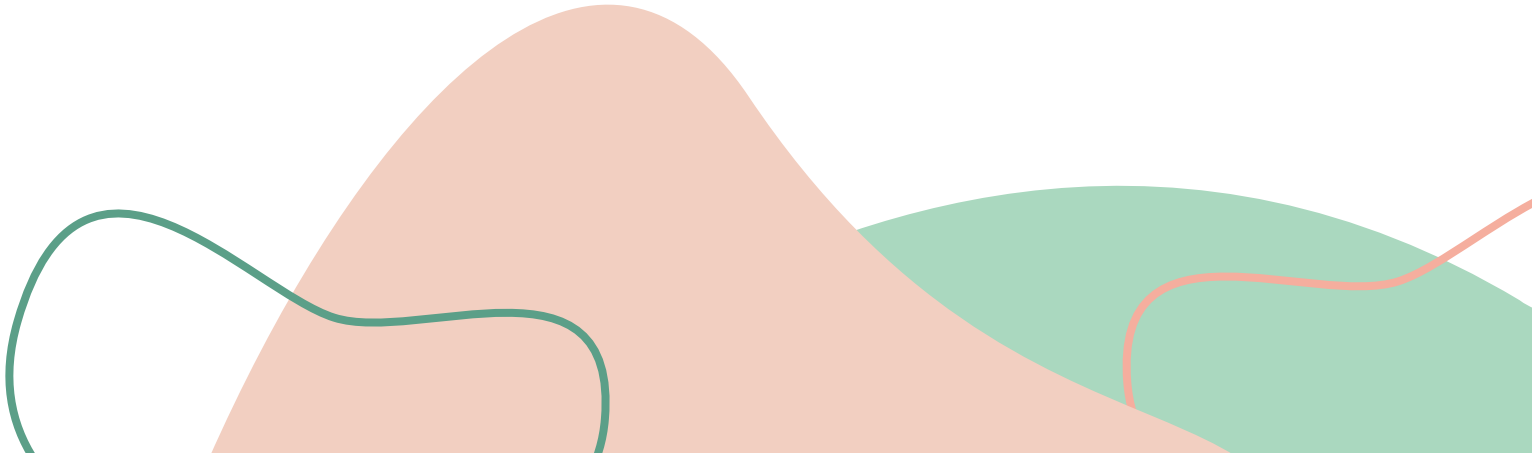
